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The National Catholic Youth Conference (NCYC) is the premier Catholic youth conference in the US. NCYC gathers young people across the nation along with artists, speakers, and experiences that will transform your life forever.





Dear Priests, Pilgrims, Parents, & Group Leaders,

The National Federation for Catholic Youth Ministry (NFCYM) is excited to offer the National Catholic Youth Conference (NCYC) to young people across the country, including those from the Diocse of Helena. This year, NCYC will be held in Indianapolis, IN, November 16-18, 2023.

NCYC is the premiere Catholic youth event on a national scale that gathers people from across America for a life-changing encounter with Christ. Catholic teenagers (grades 9-12) and their adult chaperones will experience three-days of prayer, community, evangelization, catechesis, and service.

This year's **theme is Fully Alive, inspired by Genesis 1:23-27**. The theme explores the mystery of our creation in the image of God. When we are fully alive, we are the pinnacle of creation, vibrant and intellectual while also full of faith! It brings us to worship and to go out as stewards of our world, caring for our creation and our brothers and sisters around us.

To be fully alive is to be like Christ. At NCYC, the team of speakers and artists will help our teens reflect on how they, too, are made in the image and likeness of God and are called to be Fully Alive in his presence.

What to expect at NCYC:

- Mass & Adoration Celebrate liturgy and the Eucharist with thousands, led by you, and bishops from across the country
- Music & Worship Praise and entertainment led by Grammy-winning artists
- Interactive Exhibits Games, crafts, obstacle courses, meetups, live radio shows, challenges, and much more

The family and parish are the core of where our young people experience the Church. This is why we expect young people to attend NCYC as a part of a local faith group (e.g. parish or school youth group). Large gatherings like NCYC provide memory-making, life-changing moments of grace that help inspire young people in their faith life. Yet, it is their local community who helps sustain the flame of faith long-after they return home.

Anyone can buy a ticket and attend a rock concert. It takes real intention, planning, and, most importantly, prayer to organize a life-changing spiritual journey. - Fund Raising: Work with your local parish to help raise funds to send your child to NCYC. Certainly, your local faith community has a duty to support your child's faith development, and you and your family also have a responsibility to make sacrifices. Suggestion: one of the best fund raisers for a high school-aged youth is a part-time job!
- The experience of NCYC can be difficult to put into words. Those who did not experience NCYC may find it frustrating when they only get simple answers to probing questions. This is more often because pilgrims are still processing the experience, not that they do not want to share it.

Experience NCYC with your child and see your relationships bloom, both your relationship with your child and with the Lord.

Especially for those who are unable to attend NCYC with their child, here are some tips and suggestions for encouraging and relating to your child before, after, and during this pilgrimage, along with some of the practical information you need to know:

- **Pray with and for your child** (emphasis on "with"). Your witness to the faith will have a vastly greater influence on your child than anything at NCYC.
- Chaperones & Appropriate Behavior/Apparel: Appropriate behavior and apparel at NCYC begins with conversations at home when Mom and Dad set clear expectations for their children. In addition, please make sure that your child knows who their Adult Chaperone is, that you exchange information with the Adult Chaperone, and that your child has read and understands the Code of Conduct.



Some conversation starters:

What was one thing you heard that you do NOT want to forget? How would you describe your experience? When did you feel closest to God?

What was the hardest part about going to NCYC? What challenged you?

Rather than asking...


- How was it?
- What was the best part?
- What did you do?
- What was your favorite thing?

Consider asking...

- What was one thing you will remember?
- What did you journal about?
- What was a prayer experience you enjoyed?
- Did you learn any new songs or prayers?

Young People

Why go?

Saying, "you should go because Jesus wants you to" or "because it's fun" or "because you will have a life-changing experience," will never be fully convincing. There are plenty of videos, memes, and social media #'s that do a great job of sharing why you should go. Check them out (<u>ncyc.info</u>). Then, ask someone who's gone before and have a *conversation*. Trust that the Lord has a plan for you, and we hope it includes you coming with us on this pilgrimage because Jesus wants you to, it's incredibly fun, and you will make life-changing memories.

Who?

NCYC is for any high school youth in grades 9-12 and their adult chaperones. You do NOT have to be Catholic! You must, however, travel with a local parish/group; you may not go alone.

What is NCYC?

A 3-day experience that features a variety of faith-filled activities, messages of hope and inspiration, all focused around the Sacraments and teachings of the Church. But what do you actually *do* at NCYC? Practically speaking, you spend the day choosing your own adventure: choose workshops; play in the activity center; shop for the latest Catholic gear; share your talents at the open mic; visit with Catholic colleges and religious orders; and more. At night we gather as one Church - all 20,000 of us - and celebrate Mass, spend time in Eucharistic Adoration, sing praise and worship music, etc.

But it's expensive.

Yep. Any pilgrimage takes sacrifice. We will partner with you and your local parish to help you make this pilgrimage financially possible.

Why NCYC?



The National Catholic Youth Conference is a profound experience. It is hard to articulate the lasting impact and power that this threeday event has on the youth who attend. Here is the personal NCYC story of Schola Eburuoh, now an NCYC alum and excited young Catholic. **"Itruly loved NCYC** and can attest to the transformative love that thousands of young people experienced and witnessed throughout the conference. I am so honored and excited to share my story with you!

I was chosen by an anonymous administrator at my high school to attend NCYC as a sophomore. I was a very shy and timid student, so this surprised me. I was barely acquainted with the others who were chosen, but they each already knew each other pretty well, so I thought to myself, 'will I be lonely on this trip?'...

I was told that I would truly experience God's love in a radical way, but thought, 'can't I do this from the comfort of my home?' I was so hesitant and caught up in my preconceptions of being "alone." To make matters worse, I was also volunteered to be an ambassador during the conference—at this time, I labeled myself as 'not the type to lead' and I also learned that I would be on a twelve-hour bus ride on my birthday, which was the last day of the conference. To say the least, I was not excited, nor did I appreciate the opportunity to go to NCYC at all.

The bus ride there started to bring me out of my shell as we played games to get to know each other, but upon our arrival, I told myself that all I had to do was get through this weekend, and it'd all be fine. Boy, was I in for it. My group walked into Lucus Oil Stadium in awe as we saw a packed stadium of people our age jamming to a praise and worship band. I had never heard of a Christian concert, so it was breathtaking to see the number of people in the stadium dancing and singing along.

Students in my group wanted to get closer, so we linked arms and made our way to the stage. It was so much fun. After the concert, we prayed together and were introduced to the keynote speakers. I remember on that first day hearing the phrase "open your heart to Jesus" multiple times, and the theme of the conference, "Here I am Lord," really stuck with me throughout the weekend...

I introduced speakers, prayed in small groups with complete strangers, and felt close to them, as if we were family. Even walking and talking to people outside of the convention center was radical to me. Everyone was so kind and had a faith which radiated when they greeted me or listened intently to what I had to say...I was even brought to tears before it was all over...

I remember those days and realize that Christ had spoken to my heart from that very first day, and throughout the rest of the conference. God's intervening hand completely broke my shell and pushed me to see the love that I was missing before that weekend— the love of encounterment, of friendships, and of community. The feeling of community founded upon Christ's immense mercy and love is there and continues to be such a blessing in my friendships. Thank you for this opportunity to share."

"In brief, to accompany requires placing oneself at the disposal of the Spirit of the Lord and of the one accompanied, with all his or her qualities and capacities, and then having the courage to step aside with humility." -Synod on Young People, the Faith, & Vocational Discernment (101)



Things to do/know:

1. Register Yourself: Yes, you have to register (and pay) as a group leader. Each parish/school group must have at least one one Group Leader who is an adult (21+). This does not have to be a paid person (e.g. Youth Minister).

It can be any adult who meets Safe Environment guidelines and agrees to be the liaison between the diocese/parish and the NCYC participants and their parents. This means you will be responsible for communicating deadlines, managing registration paperwork, collecting fees, assisting with fund raisers, coordinating travel, etc.

2. Registration: Group Leaders will be expected to collect all registration forms and documents. You may use the forms at the end of the Handbook to gather the pertinent details for each person *and then enter it online at diocesehelena.org/ncyc*. Or, after communicating with your people, you may instruct them to register themselves online. That's up to you. Payment may be made by either card online or you can send a check.

3. Forms & Deadlines: We have **two deadlines** (**June 30 & Sept. 15**), in part, because we want to ease the burden of having to pay the entire registration fee at once. Tickets will be available on a first-come, first-serve basis, so make sure to register early!.

Refunds/Cancellations:

- June 30: If you cancel on or before June 30, we will offer a full refund, minus a \$50 processing fee.
- July 1-September 15: If you cancel between July 1 and September 15, there will be a \$150 cancellation fee, with the remaining balance that you have paid refunded to you.
- September 15-November 15: If you cancel between September 16 and November 15, there will be a \$400 cancellation fee, with the remaining balance that you have paid refunded to you.

4. Travel: Group Leaders will be responsible for planning the travel arrangements for their group. OYYAM can provide suggestions or referrals to travel agents, but you have to decide what works best for your group.

You're welcome to drive your car, rent a bus, or walk - whatever is easiest for your group and meets safe environment policies. Most likely, you'll have to take an airplane. Whatever you do, just make sure that you **arrive by 12noon on Nov. 16 and leave after 11pm on Nov. 18**.

Airport - IND: Indianapolis International Airport (Code: IND)

Ground Transportation: The airport is (depending on traffic) about a 20 minute drive from the Convention Center. Smaller groups may fit in an Uber; Larger groups might need a bus. Plan your ground transportation accordingly. Find ground transportation options on the IND Airport website: ind.com/transportation-car-rental

Hotel: We will be assigned a hotel in Spring 2023. We will be within walking distance of the Convention Center.

Other Pertinent Details

Registration is to be managed through the local parish/school! NCYC is meant to be experienced with a local parish/school, which is why individuals are not allowed to register; they must attend as a part of local faith community (e.g. parish or school youth group). All youth must be accompanied by a Safe Environment (VIRTUS) adult. This is usually the youth minister or other adult volunteer (or their parent) from the parish/school and will also help coordinate travel, food, and housing. Do not register without first communicating with your local youth minister/pastor and confirming an Adult Chaperone for your youth.

Payments:

You will have the option to pay by credit card or you may print an invoice to send payment by check. We highly recommend that each group submit one payment to the diocese for all of their participants! You do, however, have the option to direct your people to register and submit payment individually at diocesehelena.org/ncyc. The payment is broken into two installments as noted above in order to spread the payments out over time. You may, of course, submit the full payment (\$650 per person) anytime.

Some Definitions/Notes:

Group Leader: A staff or volunteer adult (21+) who will be organizing a local group (e.g. parish youth group) to attend NCYC as a part of the Diocese of Helena delegation.

Adult: 21+: An adult is someone who is 21+. All adults will be expected to comply with all Safe Environment (VIRTUS) policies. Only those who are 21+ may serve as an official Adult Chaperone who counts towards the 6:1 youth-to-chaperone ratio. Young adults who are 18-20 and not in high school are welcome to participate as an Assistant Chaperone with a local parish/school; they may not participate as an individual. (see below)

Youth Participant: A youth in grade 9-12 who will attend NCYC. Those who are 18 years old AND still in high school (e.g. an 18 year old Senior) are still considered to be a "Youth Participant." Before registering, all youth must have a designated adult who will assume chaperoning responsibilities for him/her.

Young Adults (18-20, not in high school): NFCYM does not object to their participation in NCYC if they act in a leadership capacity within a parish or diocesan youth ministry program on a regular basis. In this case, these young adults must register as adults, be housed as adults, and act as adults (chaperones) but may not be counted as chaperones. They should understand that their presence at NCYC is as a role model and not as a youth participant.

Children in K-8: NCYC is designed for high school age students and NFCYM strongly discourages participation in NCYC by children between the ages of 5 and 13 years of age.

Children Younger than School Age: Children not yet school age (eg. infants) who must travel to NCYC with their parents do not need to pay the registration fee. NFYCM expects parents to be responsible and care for/supervise their children at all times. Parents are encouraged to check in with the registration desk on site for identification for their children. Please contact Kevin if you plan to bring a child: kmolm@diocesehelena.org.





Trip vs. Pilgrimage

Planning a great *trip* to see a concert is pretty easy: buy your ticket online, book a flight and hotel, check Yelp for restaurants, and return home with some selfies and fun stories to brag to your friends.

Planning a great *pilgrimage* takes much, much more. Make your experience at NCYC a truly transformative encounter with the Lord through intentional planning that helps you and your youth to have a truly life-changing moment of grace. Key differences:

- Pilgrims perceive an **internal dimension** to the pilgrimage, while tourists are concerned with the external journey alone
- Pilgrims invest themselves, while tourists avoid a personal commitment
- The focus for **the pilgrim will be affected** by the pilgrimage, while tourists seek to remain untouched on a deep level by their experiences
- Both **the journey and arrival are important** to the pilgrim, while only the arrival matters for a tourist
- Community is formed for pilgrims, while it is not a goal for tourists

Get Ready for Adventure




How you prepare for your pilgrimage will influence your experience:

- Prayerfully consider if God is calling you to participate in this journey.
- Begin a Pilgrimage Journal individually and one for the whole group - to write, draw, record, or reflect on prayers & experiences
- Attend Mass and Reconciliation together
- Set spiritual goals and put them in writing
- Research other popular pilgrimage sites and events (e.g. World Youth Day; Lourdes, France; Our Lady of Guadalupe, Mexico; Walk to Mary Pilgrimage, Wisconsin)
- Design a group pilgrimage logo, prayer, and motto

Experience NCYC

You've arrived! Make the most of your time during conference. Some tips and suggestions:

- Keep your journal going; write down one message from each session
- Set a spiritual goal for each day; write it down in your journal
- · Seek some space and time for quiet, silent reflection
- · Seek out new people, friends, and experiences
- · Sit next to someone new during our daily diocesan-group meetings
- · Proclaim the Gospel on your social media accounts
- Set a spiritual goal that you want to continue after your NCYC experience; then, set calendar reminders on your phone to "check-in" on your progress on the 23rd of each month for 1 year



Keep Walking the Faith



Our walk with the Lord never ends. Keep the pilgrimage alive:

- Set a date for a "reunion" dinner with your local parish
- Find an accountability partner to share your spiritual goal with and who can help keep you on track
- Send thank you cards to anyone who helped you get to NCYC (e.g. donors, youth minister, your parents), to any presenter/musician whose message resonated with you, or other pilgrims you met
- Ask your pastor to share a brief (5 minutes or less) testimony after Mass with the congregation about your NCYC experience

Fundraising



"And I tell you, ask and you will receive; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you." -Jesus (Lk. 11:9)

Raising funds is hard! You are not alone. Following these principles and steps can help.

Fundraising isn't a matter of learning salesmanship. It is an attitude, an invitation to allow others to be generous. Meditate on the following scripture passages to form your own attitudes and convictions about fund raising:

How to fundraise for NCYC 2023

There are countless ideas and ways to fund raise. A simple online search will give you thousands! Work with your local parish to see what might work best in your community. Two tried and true fund raising ideas:



Sample Phone Conversation

- "Hi Grandma, this is _____. How are you doing? (Allow a short time for small talk then quickly get to the point.) "I am glad you are doing well. I was wondering if you received my letter this week?...You have? GREAT! I am really excited about this opportunity and am calling to see if you would support me on my trip to NCYC."
- If YES (I would like to give): (Ask Grandma): "My goal is to raise \$XXX, and I'm keeping a record of the gifts I receive. Do you have an amount in mind today? ...Thank You! You can make the check payable to me and return it in the envelope I enclosed with the letter."
- If NO (I am unable to give): (Respond warmly and don't end the conversation abruptly): "Grandma, I appreciate your time, and I look forward to seeing you at our family reunion this summer."
- **Don't forget to send a thank you note within
 24-48 hours of receiving a "yes" on the phone!**

2) Get a part-time job (at \$15 per hour, you need 85 hours, or 6, 15-hour weeks)

Asking Friends & Family:

The first step is to set a goal. Example:

Registration: \$650

Next, make a list of people to contact:

 Family members, friends, priests, people from your parish, etc. Also, think of people whom you admire or who have invested in you in the past.

Write a letter to send/give to your contacts

- Make sure to personally sign and addressed each letter!
- See a sample on next page.
- In the letter describe why you want to go to NCYC and invite them to contribute to your pilgrimage by sending a check or money back to you. (Checks must be made out to you, not the parish/diocese. Because it is made out to you, it is a gift to an individual and will not be tax deductible.)
- Include one small return envelope with a stamp and addressed as follows:
 (For Example:)

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- Put the letter and the smaller envelope with your address and a stamp into a larger envelope.
- Address the larger envelope to the person (make sure the large envelope matches the personal letter!), stamp it, and send it.

Follow up!

• Within 1-2 weeks of sending the letters, call (don't text!) everyone to whom you sent a letter.

Keep Track and Write a Thank You!

• Send thank you notes promptly (1-2 days) after someone agrees to sponsor your trip.

After the Conference...

• Send out a letter to everyone who sponsored you that shares about your experiences at NCYC. Thank them again for their generosity.

Sample letter to contacts...

I, the undersigned hereby grant permission for me/my son/daughter (Participant) to attend and participate in the 2023 National Catholic Youth Convention (NCYC) in Indianapolis, IN, on November 16-18, 2023, which will require transportation away from my home church. As a legal adult myself or the parent/legal guardian of Participant, I remain legally responsible for any personal actions taken by Participant. I agree on behalf of myself/my child, or our heirs, successors, and assigns, to hold harmless and defend my parish/school and the Roman Catholic Bishop of Helena, Diocese of Helena (Diocese), adult chaperones, and representatives associated with NCYC, arising from or in connection with me/my child attending NCYC or in connection with any illness, injury or cost of medical treatment in connection therewith, and I agree to compensate the parish, its directors and agents, and the Diocese, chaperones or its representatives for reasonable attorney's fees and expenses arising in connection therewith.

I hereby warrant that to the best of my knowledge, Participant is in good health, and I assume all responsibility for the health of me/my child. In the event of an emergency, I hereby give permission to transport me/my child to a hospital for emergency medical or surgical treatment. I wish to be advised prior to any further treatment by the hospital/doctor.

I/my child agrees to abide by all rules attached to NCYC. Specific behaviors that are not permitted include but are not limited to: fighting, obscene language, offensive or revealing clothing, and the use/possession of tobacco, vaping products, alcohol, illegal drugs, and weapons. I also understand that if Participant violates any of the rules, Participant may be required to leave the activity at his/her own expense.

Event directors and adult chaperones have the authority to prohibit video camera or other forms of imagerecording devices, as appropriate, to prevent distractions or to protect against violating the privacy of participants. Violation of this policy may result in confiscation of such equipment for the duration of NCYC and/or dismissal from the event(s).

By signing this form I understand that a picture of myself/my child and/or work or projects created by myself/my child (e.g. still pictures, audio/video recording, etc.) may be published in print or online by my parish, school, Legendary Lodge, Diocese, The Foundation for the Diocese of Helena, Carroll College, the National Federation for Catholic Youth Ministry (NFCYM), or their agents to advance the mission and purpose of the Catholic Church. I also grant Diocese permission to share the information included on the registration form with these or other entities to advance the mission and purpose of the Catholic Church.
